PART I: SPECIFIC CONDITIONS

This grant agreement (the Agreement) has been entered into between:

- (1) The Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MFA), represented by the Section for Humanitarian Affairs, and
- (2) Plan International Norway, a Norwegian non-governmental organisation (foundation) duly established in Norway under registration number 976793382 (the Grant Recipient),

jointly referred to as the Parties.

1 SCOPE AND BACKGROUND

- 1.1 The Grant Recipient has submitted an application to MFA dated 24.02.2021 (the Application) regarding financial support to the project titled QUALITY EDUCATION AND PROTECTION FROM VIOLENCE IN WEST AND CENTRAL AFRICA, RAF-21/0013 (the Project). The estimated costs of the Project are indicated in the budget attached as Annex A to this Agreement.
- 1.2 MFA has decided to award a grant to be used exclusively for the implementation of the Project (the Grant). The Parties expect the Project to be implemented during the period from January 2021 to December 2023 (the Support Period).
- 1.3 The Parties have agreed to enter into an Agreement, consisting of this part I; Specific Conditions, part II; General Conditions, and part III; Procurement Provisions, all of which form an integral part of this Agreement. In the event of discrepancies between the Specific Conditions and the General Conditions or Procurement Provisions, the Specific Conditions shall prevail.

2 OBJECTIVES OF THE PROJECT

2.1 The expected results of the Project are as follows:

The expected effects for the target group of the Project are strengthened resilience through improved protection and quality and inclusive education (Outcome). The outcomes vary between the different project areas, i.e., Niger, Mali, Burkina Faso and the West and Central Africa region, as specified below.

Niger

- Outcome 1: Crisis affected children and young people are protected from sexual and genderbased violence, abuse, neglect, and exploitation and survivors have access to quality protection services and psychosocial support
- Outcome 2: Continued access to quality education for children ensured

- Outcome 1: Crisis affected children and young people are protected from sexual and genderbased violence, abuse, neglect, and exploitation and survivors have access to quality protection services and psychosocial support
- Outcome 2: A strengthened protective environment in which girls, boys, caregivers and community members recognize, prevent and respond to child protection risks
- Outcome 3: Continued access to quality education for children ensured

Burkina Faso

- Outcome 1: Crisis affected children and young people are protected from sexual and genderbased violence, abuse, neglect, and exploitation and survivors have access to quality protection services and psychosocial support
- Outcome 2: Continued access to quality education for children ensured

West and Central Africa (Regional)

- Outcome 1: All the countries in the WACA region, have endorsed the Safe Schools Declaration.
- Outcome 2: Concrete actions are carried out by governments to implement the Safe Schools Declaration and its guidelines.

The main intended target group is children living in fragile settings, conflict or displacement, with a particular focus on adolescent girls. For the regional part of the project, which primarily focuses on advocacy on regional, national and local level, the target group includes government representatives, Clusters and the wider humanitarian coordination mechanisms, Safe Schools Declaration (SSD) working groups or committees, local/regional education authorities, media, INGOs, civil society and teachers/headmasters/parent teacher associations.

2.2 The full results framework is included as Annex B to this Agreement. An updated results framework with baselines shall be submitted within 6 months after signing of this Agreement.

3 IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PROJECT

- 3.1 The Project shall be implemented in accordance with the Agreement, including all annexes, and the latest approved Application, including implementation plan and budget.
- 3.2 During the implementation of the Project, the Grant Recipient shall exercise the necessary diligence, efficiency and transparency in line with sound financial management and best practise principles.
- 3.3 The Grant Recipient shall continuously identify, assess and mitigate any relevant risks associated with the implementation of the Project. The risk of potential negative effects of the Project in the following cases (Cross-Cutting Issues) shall always be included in the risk management of the Project:
 - anti-corruption
 - climate and environment,
 - women's rights and gender equality, and

- human rights (with a particular focus on participation, accountability and nondiscrimination)
- 3.4 The Grant Recipient shall immediately inform MFA of any circumstances likely to hamper or delay the successful implementation of the Project.
- 3.5 The Grant Recipient shall be familiar with UN Security Council Resolution 1325 on women, peace and security (s/res/1325 (2000)), and implement the Project in a way that promotes the intentions of the resolution in the best possible way. A statement on how the intentions of this resolution have been addressed shall be included in the progress reports and final report of the Project.
- The Grant Recipient shall ensure that the Project is implemented in respect of and in accordance with international humanitarian law and international human rights law and that the implementation of the Project is guided by and complies with the international humanitarian principles of humanity, neutrality, impartiality and independence.

THE GRANT

- The Grant shall amount to maximum NOK 30 000 000 (Norwegian Kroner thirty 4.1 million), the tentative disbursement plan is as follows: NOK 10 000 000 (Norwegian Kroner ten million) per budget year of the project period.
- 4.2 Disbursement after the current calendar year is subject to Norwegian Parliamentary appropriations. Significant reductions in the Parliament's annual allocation to the relevant budget line may lead to a reduction in annual Grant allocations and/or in the total Grant amount. The annual Grant allocations must be confirmed by MFA following the Parliament's approval of the state budget for the relevant budget year. If the Grant amount is reduced the Grant Recipient must revise the implementation plan, budget and results framework correspondingly.
- 4.3 The Grant, including accrued interest, shall be used exclusively to finance the actual costs of the implementation of the Project during the Support Period.
- 4.4 The Grant may be used to cover overheads/indirect costs up to a maximum of 7 % of MFA's pro rata share of the incurred direct project costs of the Project.
- The Grant Recipient is responsible for obtaining any additional resources which may be required to duly implement the Project.

DISBURSEMENT 5

The Grant shall be disbursed in advance instalments based on the financial need of the 5.1 Project for the upcoming period, which shall not exceed six months. The disbursements shall be made upon MFA's receipt of written disbursement requests from the Grant Recipient, describing the financial need for the period in question. The first disbursement

shall include approved Project expenses incurred from January 2021 to the signing of this Agreement.

- 5.2 Financial need refers to the budgeted expenditure for the upcoming period, minus any funds available to the Project from all other sources during the same period.
- 5.3 The financial need shall be documented through an updated financial statement for the Project and a reference to the latest approved implementation plan and budget.
- 5.4 The disbursement requests shall be signed by an authorised representative of the Grant Recipient. A confirmation that the Project is being implemented in accordance with the Agreement shall be included in the disbursement request.
- 5.5 All disbursements are conditional upon the Grant Recipient's continued compliance with the requirements of the Agreement, including the timely fulfilment of reporting obligations. MFA may withhold disbursements in accordance with article 17 of the General Conditions if it finds that the requirements of the Agreement have not been met. Except for the Project's first year, the second disbursement each year is subject to MFA's receipt and approval of the progress report and financial report.
- 5.6 The Grant Recipient shall have a separate bank account exclusively for grants from MFA. All disbursements will be made to the following bank account:

5.7 The Grant Recipient shall immediately acknowledge receipt of the funds in writing. The amount received shall be stated, as well as the date of receipt and the exchange rate applied.

6 REPORTING AND OTHER DOCUMENTATION

- 6.1 The following shall be submitted by the Grant Recipient to MFA:
 - a) A progress report covering the period from January to December shall be submitted to MFA by 1 July each year. The progress report shall include the content specified in article 2 of the General Conditions. MFA's standard reporting format shall be used. The report for 2021 shall cover the period from the start of the Support period to 31 December 2021.
 - b) A financial report covering the period from January to December shall be submitted to MFA by 1 July each year. The financial report shall include the content specified in article 3 of the General Conditions. The report for 2021 shall cover the period from the start of the Support period to 31 December 2021. The final financial report shall cover the entire Support Period and shall be submitted along with the final report referred to in article 6.1 f) of the Specific Conditions.

- c) An audit report covering the annual financial statements of the Project shall be submitted to MFA by 1 July each year. The audit report shall comply with the requirements set out in article 7 of the Specific Conditions and article 5 of the General Conditions. The management letter (matters for governance attention) shall be attached to the audit report.
- d) An updated implementation plan and budget covering the period from January to December shall be submitted to MFA by 1 December each year. The implementation plan and budget shall include the content listed in article 1 of the General Conditions.
- e) The organisational wide audit report of the Grant Recipient shall be submitted to MFA for information by end October each year. If the auditor in addition submits a management letter (matters for governance attention) this shall be attached to the audit report.
- f) A final report for the Support Period shall be submitted to MFA no later than six 6 months after the end of the Support Period. The final report shall include the content listed in article 4 of the General Conditions. MFA's standard reporting format shall be used.
- 6.2 If the Grant Recipient is unable to meet the deadlines set out above, MFA shall be informed immediately.
- 6.3 All implementation plans, budgets and reports shall be approved in writing by MFA unless otherwise agreed by the Parties.

7 AUDIT

- 7.1 The annual financial statements of the Project shall be audited in accordance with International Standards of Auditing (ISA). The auditor shall comply with all ISAs relevant to the audit, ref. ISA 200 (Overall objectives of the independent auditor and the conduct of an audit in accordance with international standards on auditing), paragraphs 18 and 20. Of Particular relevance is ISA 240 (The Auditor's responsibility to Consider Fraud and Error in an Audit of Financial Statements), and ISA 805 ("Special Considerations audits of single financial statements and specific elements, accounts or items of a financial statement").
- 7.2 Additional requirements applicable to the auditor and the audit report are included in article 5 of the General Conditions.
- 7.3 The Grant Recipient is responsible for submitting the audit report to MFA within the deadline indicated in article 6 of the Specific Conditions.

8 FORMAL MEETINGS

- 8.1 The Parties shall hold formal meetings once per year, within October in order to discuss i.a. the results achieved by the Project during the Support Period. The meetings shall be called and chaired by the Grant Recipient.
- 8.2 Unless otherwise agreed, the Parties shall discuss the latest progress report and financial report, as well as the implementation plan and budget for the upcoming period.

8.3 The Grant Recipient shall record main issues discussed, points of view expressed and decisions made, in minutes from the meeting. The Grant Recipient shall submit the minutes to MFA no later than two weeks after the meeting for comments. The agreed minutes shall be signed by both Parties.

9 REVIEWS AND OTHER FOLLOW-UP MEASURES

9.1 If the Grant Recipient or another interested party initiates a review or evaluation of activities wholly or partly funded by the Grant, MFA shall be informed. The Grant Recipient shall forward a copy of the report of any such review or evaluation to MFA without undue delay.

10 PROCUREMENT

10.1 All procurement under the Project shall be completed in accordance with the Procurement Provisions in Part III of this Agreement.

11 REPAYMENT OF INTEREST AND UNUSED FUNDS

- 11.1 Upon the end of the Support Period or upon termination of this Agreement, any unused funds that total NOK 500 or more shall in its entirety be repaid to MFA as soon as possible and at the latest within 6 months. The repayment shall include any interest which have not been used for Project purposes, and other financial gain accrued on the Grant.
- 11.2 Repayments shall be made to the following bank account:

11.3 The transaction shall be clearly marked: "Unused funds". The name of the Grant Recipient shall be stated, along with MFA's agreement number and agreement title.

12 SPECIAL PROVISIONS

- 12.1 General Conditions article 12 clause 2. d) shall be replaced with: "changes to the Project's annual budget that imply reallocation of more than 10 % of a budget line. Changes that amount to less than NOK 30 000 do not need to be pre-approved.
- 12.2 General Conditions article 12 clause 2 c) shall be replaced with: "changes to the implementation plan which implies a delay that may influence the achievement of expected results as presented in the results framework".
- 12.3 The following shall be added to article 2 clause 2 of the General Conditions: "Gender disaggregated data shall be provided where relevant."


